History of Valentine's Day

As we all know, Valentine's Day is a ubiquitous holiday that is celebrated worldwide in many different countries.

The origins of Valentine's Day are not exactly confirmed, but there are some speculations that many people believe. One of the many popular origin stories of the "Holiday of Love" comes from A.D. 270, where a large majority speculates that it is celebrating Valentinus' death or burial. It may sound bizarre that we have a holiday surrounding a bishop's death, but there is more to the story that most people don't know.

Valentinus was either a priest or Bishop that ministered to and helped to marry prosecuted Christians, whom refused to worship the gods of Rome. He was later jailed for this, and ironically became good friends with his jailor's daughter, eventually sending her the infamous letter that was signed, "From your Valentine."

Although this is one of the more popular stories, historians have begun to believe that Valentine's Day was formed to cover up the pagan holiday, "Lupercalia," which was an annual ancient festival celebrated in Rome on Feb. 15. During this festival, which honored the fertility god Lupercus, men would draw women's names from a jar and spend the festival with them, often leading to marriages.

While we saw the origins of Valentine's Day in the third century, it wasn't actually until around the 15th century when we saw the start of many traditions that we know and love today.

By this time, it was common for people to exchange handwritten letters and notes to show their affection for one another.

Of course, the holiday was still on the rise, but it wasn't until the 1800s that we saw a massive rise in printing technology and how it completely changed the game for consumers, allowing for a quick and easy way to show your gratitude for someone.

More often than not, these readily available cards would depict images of cupids, angels, hearts and all things love.

Now, we don't see the use of the fun Valentine cards as often as we maybe once did in Elementary school, it's safe to say that it's more common to see someone send a text message to show their gratitude.






"The Love Hypothesis"




"They Both Die at the End"


The majority who voted for it should be a holiday said how it should be celebrated to show love and affection.




Maddison Beer - Adela G.

The LVII was a bluish-green and red, and the two teams who we're playing were the Philadelphia Eagles and the Kansas City Chiefs.



Trash -


